In addition, we have a strong class of Silver Beavers at the Council level. Our Council President John Brinker, Cachuma District Membership Chair Lana Gundry and Cachuma District Commissioner Aaron Houston are the three recipients of the 2017 Silver Beaver award for all of their hard work towards the improvement and growth of Scouting in our Council.

I am also very proud to share that one of our past Council Presidents, Rick TerBorch, will be the recipient of the Silver Antelope at this year's National Annual meeting in Dallas Texas. Rick will be receiving this recognition from the BSA's Western Region for his dedication and leadership to the growth of the Scouting movement in our region. Rick currently serves as the Area 4 commissioner and has served in various position in the area for many years.

Congratulations to all our volunteers and thank you for your continued service of our youth and communities.

Rancho Alegre update

It has been nine months since the Whittier fire completely destroyed our camp, Rancho Alegre. Since then we have been working diligently to rebuild Rancho Alegre with the vision of making it a community resource for all our families. We are still working with our insurance company in efforts to retrieve some of the cost to rebuild. While we are doing that we prepared camp for the rainy season in efforts to not incur any further damage to the 3 structures still standing. The erosion control set in place has worked well and protected the identified parts of camp. Demolition is complete, so now we are finally in the rebuilding stage. We have completed a survey, several stakeholder meetings, and a workshop to collect all your input to construct an initial draft plan of NEW Rancho Alegre. When the plan is finalized we will share it with all of you and give everyone an opportunity to be part of the rebuilding of our beautiful camp. We have added a project manager, John Mathews, to our efforts so we can stay on schedule and have Rancho Alegre operational by the fall of 2019. There will be Scout camping opportunities before then, limited only by safety issues we may face.

Sadly, our Outdoor School will go dormant for one academic year. A realistic assessment of the total time requirement for site development, coupled with the ongoing financial strain and safety of operating our school at a secondary site, prohibit us from offering a quality Outdoor School program for the 2018-2019 school year. For this reason, we will work with schools to provide whatever assistance that we can, to temporarily serve schools through other outdoor science programs. We are in the process of attempting to plan with some other programs to offer a one-year discounted rate to the schools that we refer to them. We will continue to look for other 2018-2019 outdoor school opportunities.

Serving more youth is still our priority

Your support of our Friends of Scouting campaign this year will be more meaningful and impactful than ever before. While we are making great strides toward getting increased support from local community business and foundations we have lost a large portion of our operational income due to the loss of our camp operations. Rancho Alegre accounted for 55% of our annual \$2.1 million operational income. Rancho Alegre would produce enough net income to subsidize our Scouting program on a yearly basis.

With the loss of camp and the inability to run a profitable outdoor experience to our community in a rented facility we will need everyone's support to maintain momentum while Rancho Alegre is rebuilt. Your support in FOS greatly increases the chance that we can get additional community support and improve the service we give you and our Scouts. The campaign has kicked off, and there are several ways to participate:

Youth Protection Training Must Be Renewed Every Year – per the policy of the Western Region of the Boy Scouts of America. The web site allows for 2 years until the YPT refresher, but that is not the policy we are working to.

2018 National Youth Leadership Training

WHAT IS NATIONAL YOUTH LEADERSHIP TRAINING (NYLT)?

NYLT is an outdoor leadership training program for youth leaders developed by the Boy Scouts of America. A highly trained youth staff under the supervision of adult advisors set the example in modeling the core learning and leadership messages of the NYLT syllabus.

The course focuses on teaching advanced leadership skills through the patrol or crew method. The participants will be challenged to accomplish activities and projects using the leadership skills taught in the course. Participants will experience the simulation of a month in the life of a unit, complete with meetings, activities, and planning for the big monthly outing.

WHAT ARE THE COURSE OBJECTIVES?

 To give participants the confidence and knowledge to run their unit program;

 To teach and practice key leadership skills and relate these skills to the participant's unit responsibilities;

 To give participants the opportunity to share ideas and experiences that other Scouts and Venturers have found to be successful and useful in their home units;

 To give participants a varied experience with emphasis on the patrol method and new ways to teach Scoutcraft skills in a fun atmosphere back in their home unit;

 – To create an enthusiastic and fun situation where participants will experience "Scouting at its best";

- To enhance the relationship between the participant and his or her home unit leader.

 To create a youth training pool to assist in District level training events.

WHAT ARE THE PARTICIPANT REQUIREMENTS?

 Participants in this program must be either Venturers or Explorers at least 16 years old or Boy Scouts First Class, Star, Life or Eagle and at least 14 years of age by course start date.

- Boy Scouts attending should have had a successful experience as a patrol leader and be a Senior Patrol Leader or Assistant Senior Patrol Leader (or preparing to fill one of these positions); and have the recommendation of their unit leader.

– 13 year-old Boy Scouts and 15 year old
Venture Scouts may be considered in
exceptional cases if their Unit Leader contacts
the NYLT Course Director to recommend them.

Venture Scouts or Explorers who are
Crew or Post members looking to step into a

leadership role for their Crew, Post, or school in the upcoming year should definitely attend. – OA Chapters are encouraged to send

teams of their upcoming leaders to the course.

 All NYLT participants must have a completed Annual Health & Medical Record (AHMR) with Parts A, B and C completed. Part C of the form is the physical examination which must be signed by a certified and licensed health-care provider recognized by the BSA. Recognized providers are physicians (MD, DO), nurse practitioners, and physician's assistants. Substitute forms will not be accepted.

Updated Youth Protection Training Now Available

Over the decades, the Boy Scouts of America has been a leader in developing training and policies designed to keep young people safe. Over time, these policies have become standard with organizations across the nation. Now, the Boy Scouts of America is releasing fully updated training to further strengthen our ability to protect youth. These changes include:

 Updated Youth Protection Training, including insights from experts and survivors and the latest strategies for recognizing and preventing major forms of abuse. This is the designated Youth

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Protection Training for all adults. All volunteers must take the new training by October 1, 2018, no matter when they took the previous training.

- Effective June 1, 2018, adults accompanying a Scouting unit who are present at the activity for 72 total hours or more must be registered as a leader, including completion of a criminal background check and Youth Protection Training. The 72 hours need not be consecutive.
- An expanded ScoutsFirst Helpline to aid volunteers and families in addressing potentially dangerous situations.
- Unlimited counseling and support for healing to anyone who has ever been abused in Scouting.
- Youth Protection Training for youth members available in 2019.

Youth Protection: The Next Evolution

The next generation of the BSA's youth protection program begins with updated youth protection training that draws on research from experts in the field of child abuse and child maltreatment, as well as survivors, to identify the contributing factors and threats across the spectrum of child abuse including bullying, neglect, exposure to violence, physical and emotional abuse, as well as child sexual abuse.

Using a blend of interviews from psychologists, law enforcement professionals and survivors, leaders and parents alike will learn about the root causes of abuse, how to recognize types of abuse and how to respond. It's a bold approach and it's just one part of our ongoing effort to enroll the entire Scouting community in the fight against child abuse.

Youth Protection Training Update: My Experience

Always up for a challenge – when I heard that the new Youth Protection Training was a bit annoying, I just had to try it. We're all going to have to try it by 1 October 2018.

There are four modules in the new training. The first one is "Overview & Policies". It took me 25 minutes to get through this module. I decided that it was enough for one evening.

The next evening, I tried module 2, "Sexual Abuse". This module is far more substantial than the previous training. It was powerful to listen to victims provide their reaction to being abused. I am more motivated than ever to prevent sexual abuse in any form.

In this motivated state, I had to keep on going with module 3, "Bullying". This module took me 14 minutes.

Module 4 is the test. I was ready for the challenge. It took me 8 minutes. I won't tell you my score, but if you send in yours I'll let you know if your score tops mine.

Bottom line is that I took the training over two evenings and found it to be extremely worthwhile. The training takes about 70 minutes. This is longer than the previous training, but the new training provides additional depth and is worth the extra time.

Don't wait until October. Rise to the challenge now. Then you'll be in a good position to encourage others in your unit to take this required training.

"Of the 312 pilots and scientists selected as astronauts since 1959, 180 were Scouts or have been active in Scouting," reads a fact sheet on the Boys Scouts of America website. "Of the 12 men to physically walk on the moon's surface, 11 were involved in Scouting."

The 312 astronauts selected includes 40 Eagle Scouts, a group Melsheimer joined earlier in March. He has been involved with the Boy Scouts since he was 5 years old and finally attained all 21 merit badges, achieving the group's highest rank. He celebrated at a ceremony put on by his parents.

For his final project, Melsheimer constructed a patio area at a local church that gives preschoolers and teachers a place to relax.

Wood Badge Service Award

Celebrate the 70th anniversary of Wood Badge in the United States with a special award available only in 2018. The American Wood Badge Alumni 70th Anniversary Service Award can be earned by completing five of the nine requirements listed below. Think of this like a second, easier-to-complete Wood Badge ticket. (The actual Wood Badge ticket is a series of five projects that benefit local Scouting. After the in-person course, Wood Badgers complete these ticket items to receive their beads.)



American Wood Badge Alumni 70th Anniversary Service Award requirements

Wood Badgers will agree to and work a new ticket. To qualify for the award, individuals must complete five of the following nine requirements during the anniversary year — Jan. 1, 2018, to Dec. 31, 2018.

- 1. Register as member of the Scouting Alumni and Friends, at any level.
- 2. Attend a district, council or national level **training course** either as a participant or staff member OR serve as staff on a Wood Badge course.
- 3. Participate in a 70th Anniversary celebration in your Council such as a reception, reunion or other special acknowledgement at a Council wide event such as annual recognition or F.O.S. dinner.
- 4. Recruit another individual to attend and volunteer at a Boy Scout **training event** or Wood Badge service activity.
- 5. Share the values of Wood Badge and Scouting by recruiting an individual to take Wood Badge.
- 6. Promote Wood Badge training at a unit, district, council area, region or national event.
- 7. Contribute \$7 or \$70 or whatever larger amount you can to an existing council custodial fund for Wood Badge scholarships.
- 8. Solicit another individual to join you in contributing \$7 or \$70 or whatever larger amount they can to an existing council custodial fund for Wood Badge scholarships.
- 9. Become a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America at the unit, district or Council level. Consider such opportunities for service as: district committee, commissioner, roundtable staff, Alumni or NESA committees and more.


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


