This year has been one of the most memorable years ever for the Los Padres Council. While there have been some ups and downs, our Council finishes the year stronger and I am very optimistic about the future. I continue to be grateful for a



strong, dedicated Scout Executive and seasoned professional staff as well as for numerous volunteers who have given many hours of service in multiple areas.

By far the most significant event in 2017 affecting our Council was the Whittier Fire in July, which destroyed our beloved camp, Rancho Alegre. Since July the Phoenix (Alegre rebuild) committee has been meeting weekly. On Saturday, November 18, the committee met in the dining hall at Alegre to finalize selection of companies to help develop our master plan. We were pleased to see that the demolition project (removal of debris) at the main part of camp was completed, ahead of schedule! Water and electrical power has been restored and cleanup of damaged trees continue. I was fortunate to have two members from the Santa Barbara Botanic Garden come to Alegre earlier in the Fall to help assess the damage to the trees and other vegetation there. They were generally impressed as to how in a few short months since the fire, that many green sprouts from native plants were evident. Rains should stimulate much more growth and recovery.

Scouts and leaders from our Council attended the National Jamboree in July. My understanding is that this was an outstanding trip. The side trips to our Nation's capital and other areas were a great complement to this adventure. Thank you all for representing our council so well!

The council had a record year for new Eagle Scouts. In addition many meaningful Eagle projects were completed throughout our two counties. One of my goals is to get more publicity for these projects. We are thankful for the outstanding leadership of our Advancement Chair Jim Bartlett who has worked tirelessly with our young men. Again, congratulations to our 2017 Eagles!

On a personal note, I recently spent four days on Santa Cruz Island at the UCSB Research Center. Time was spent hiking, studying archaeology, botany and geology. The island is amazing and beautiful. A wonderful treasure right in our back yard!

Rancho Alegre News

Chumash Lodge of the Order of the Arrow (OA) recently conducted a valuable service project at Camp Rancho Alegre. On Sunday, November 26, a twelve-person contingent from the OA, led by Lodge Chief Joey Kamlet, worked to protect remaining structures and provide some erosion control to steep hillsides in the main part of camp.

The project involved spreading native seeds above the pool and shower house area, around Lake Janis, and above the main camp entrance road. Seeds for this endeavor were donated by S&S Seed of Carpenteria. This project is the first one to be authorized at camp now that demolition work is coming to a close. Top Service Projects for the Fall Quarter

Throughout the Council many Packs and Troops have been busy working on projects throughout their local communities. Unfortunately, the BSA records are unavailable for the past month & a half, so this report only reflects service entered through the end of September.

Troop 41 in Cachuma District did a project this past summer that was very environmental in nature, involving 6 scouts and scouters for 24 hours. Troop 42 had an Eagle projects as well as 2 regular projects in the Solvang area, including one for the VFW Military families, for 150 total hours.

Down in the South Coast District, Troop 4 had 2 projects in September, one involving 18 Scouts and scouters in a project that contributed 180 hours of work, the other had logged over 50 hours with 19 participants. So far this year South Coast Eagle Scouts have recorded over 1000 hours on 11 projects involving 7 different units.

Live Oak had Troop 2103 assisting the city of Lompoc with 2 projects in the early summer involving 16 scouts and scouters for over 44 hours. One was for the annual Flower festival and the other was for the Fourth of July parade. There were 6 different units that had Eagle projects completed this year with troop 394 recording 234 hours and narrowly edged out by Troop 91 with 236 hours!

The 4 Del Norte Eagles that completed projects before October of this year racked up 411 hours! Troop 51 & Troop 60 really set the pace, consistently completing community projects nearly every month! But Troop 51 really deserves a round of applause for recording 3 separate projects in September alone! Troop 123 also logged in a couple of projects earlier in the spring.

Back in Camino Real Troop 450 is a real shining star with 4 projects recoded earlier this year, in addition to 2 Eagle projects, for a grand total of 278 hours. Most of these were patriotic in focus, including providing a ceremony for respectfully retiring worn American Flags.

In November, several Troops and Packs were involved in Veteran's Day observances, some of which appeared in their local papers. Again, those hours as well as other ones for Flag raising and Flag placing ceremonies in various communities may have been reported, but were not available at this time.

Remember, it is the Units' responsibility to enter their service projects along with information about the who, what, when & where. The more details provided enables better records. As service is a vital part of each unit's basic program, it is highly likely that even more hours were donated by the other 100+ units throughout the Council, but, unfortunately, were not recorded on the JTE service website. [submitted by Zea Bauer]

- Be mentored by the District Membership Chair and become part of the District Membership team.
- Be visible and easily identifiable at unit gatherings by their *Welcoming* smiles and their BSA "*Welcome*" logo that they display and wear on an activity shirt, on a hat or vest or in some cases, a pin on a field uniform.

The benefits of having a New Member Coordinator can be substantial! If you are interested in serving as a *New Member Coordinator* for your Unit, now is the time! The Boy Scouts of America (BSA) is offering a "free" logo imprinted shirt or cap as an incentive to the first 2500 registered and trained *New Member Coordinators* (NMC) and the first 500 District-level Scouters.
