Recent Eagle Scout Service Project Accomplishments

The total number of Eagles for 2014 is fast approaching 100 and represents nearly 12,000 service hours to members of many communities, schools and organizations from Atascadero to Carpinteria. Some projects were very elaborate such as Sterling Snow's Barricade Project and some even went international like Steven Prawitt's Books for Brazil. All of the projects represent much effort by the scout as well as demonstrating his leadership skills.

Recent Unit Service Project Accomplishments

If you were watching the Channel 12 KSBY News this week, you might have seen members of Pack 13 helping with the 2014 Season of Hope toy donation collection. Just one of many service projects undertaken by Cub Scout Packs and Boy Scout Troops throughout the council. There are many miles of cleaner beaches, fresh painted walls, growing plants and other positive touches in many areas of our Council, stretching throughout 2 counties.

Scouts throughout the Los Padres Council have been busy at a variety of service projects that so far have totaled nearly 3,000 hours, involving over 450 scouts & scouters. One of the busiest units has been Troop 37, sponsored by the Elks Lodge, in the South Coast District that has recorded 8 projects for a total of over 350 hours. Pack 6, Camino Real District, sponsored by the Knights of Columbus council 1271, has listed only one project but they invested 80 hours and involved over 30 scouts & scouters working on community beautification in the San Luis Obispo area.. Troop 123, Del Norte District, sponsored by the Santa Margarita Lions Club, had a single project that totaled 140 hours in addition to their 4 other projects this year. Pack 42, Cachuma District, sponsored by the Buellton Business Association, completed one project with People Helping People that provided food for many families in the Buellton area. In the Live Oak District, Troop 2103, sponsored by the North Avenue Baptist Church, has listed 3 projects, ranging from assisting the local food bank with food collection & distribution to beach & litter cleanup in the Lompoc community.

On behalf of all those helped so far this year a very big THANK YOU to all 16 units that listed their contributions to bettering our neighborhoods. online at MyScouting.org under E-Learning. It's recommended that you take **Fast Start** and **This Is**



Scouting courses to acquaint yourself with Scouting and its Aims and Methods. Cubmasters, Asst. Cubmasters, and Den Leaders can take Cub Leader Specific training for your position and be considered trained and receive the "Trained" sleeve patch. New Scoutmasters, Varsity and Venture Leaders can also take Fast Start and This Is Scouting for your position online at MyScouting.org, but your Leader Specific Training is given in a small group setting at district or council training sessions. Check the Los Padres Council (LPCBSA.org) calendar for the training you need or contact your district training chair for information or to schedule training.

Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops (ILST)

National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) – Council Youth/Adult Staff, Aug. 3-7, Rancho Alegre. This dynamite youth

leadership training can change your troop/crew into a high powered team and help build our future leaders. It is the youth equivalent to the adult Wood Badge Leadership Skills training. It's highly recommended that adult leaders attend Wood Badge if their youth attend NYLT, so you will be on the same page and can work together to maximize the leadership skills taught in both courses.



Wood Badge Leadership Skills

Training – We just completed another successful Wood Badge course in October and are already planning the next one in Sept. 2015. Watch for updates in this newsletter and the council calendar. In the works is a course for the spring of 2016.

Commissioner Corner The Recharter Process

Unit charters within the Los Padres Council all expire on December 31. Beginning in October the Commissioner program has disbursed the recharter packages to all of the Units within the Council. As of November 17, only about 35% of our units have returned their completed charter packages. All units are strongly encouraged to complete the recharter process by mid-December. If you have questions regarding the recharter process, contact your unit serving Commissioner, or if your unit does not have an assigned unit serving Commissioner, contact your District Commissioner. It is very important that you recharter before the expiration date of your unit (12/31/14). Remember, lapsed (expired charters) units are not entitled to participate in the Scouting program, are legally uninsured by the Boy Scouts of America, and may not obtain tour permits or awards/recognitions.

As a reminder, all adult volunteers must have current Youth Protection Training valid

into 2015 in order to recharter (have completed YPT within 2 years of their last YPT session). If a volunteer does not have a valid YPT certificate into 2015 they may not reregister on the unit's recharter form. Do not hold up submissions of the recharter package beyond mid-December because a volunteer does not possess valid YPT. Drop the volunteer from the recharter form. If that person is interested in continuing as a volunteer, they can reapply after they complete their YPT. It is extremely important that your unit does not become a lapsed unit!

What are Commissioners?

The position of Commissioner is the second oldest volunteer position in the Boy Scouts of America. The Commissioner receives a commission by the Boy Scouts of America to represent the National Council and the local council to the individual units. The primary function of the Commissioner program is to provide direct service to the unit and no other volunteer position at the District or Council level is responsible for directly servicing individual units. In doing so, a Commissioner is a friend, resource, guide, trainer, mentor, facilitator and problem solver to their units. The Unit Service Plan for the Boy Scouts of America designates the unit serving Commissioner as the "go to" person for units in receiving services and assistance from the District, Council, and the Boy Scouts of America. Unit Leaders and Committee members should contact their Unit Commissioner when they have questions regarding Scouting programs and when they need advice and/or assistance from the District or Council. If your unit does not have a Unit Commissioner assigned to it, then contact your District Commissioner.

Need for Commissioners

The Los Padres Council has 48 unit-serving Commissioners and needs 20 more. If you have Scouting experience, and are not currently actively working with a unit, please consider serving as a Commissioner. At a training session on November 15, incoming and outgoing officers of Chumash Lodge 90 learned about their new duties and made plans for the 100th anniversary of the founding of the OA on Treasure Island in July 1915. Incoming Lodge Officers are Lodge Chief Alex von Dohlen (Paso Robles); Vice Chief Brandon Dutcher (Santa Barbara); Secretary Evan Cobb (Lompoc); Treasurer Patrick Konkol (Goleta); and Medicine Man (outgoing Chief) Dylan Gillespie (Nipomo). Brian Hascall of Nipomo will remain as the Lodge Adviser.

At the Section Conclave during September at Forest Lawn Scout Reservation the local lodge took home all the ceremonies competition trophies and the Outstanding Lodge of the Section Award. There were 21 Arrowman in attendance at this weekend event. The Ceremonies Team looks forward to competing at the National Conference (NOAC) next August.

At an Officers' Meeting that night, the Lodge donated \$500 to the Council for a new computer/video projector. This is in addition to the \$3000 donated earlier this year toward a climbing wall at Rancho Alegre. The Lodge learned that because of over subscription to the Centennial National Conference at Michigan State next summer that the number of attendees from this Lodge would be limited to 15 (11 youth; 4 advisers). This was a major disappointment for a number of Arrowman who wanted to attend this historic event. Over 12,000 available spots at the campus disappeared quickly with an additional 5,000 Arrowman being denied accommodation.

During January to March, Arrowman will be conducting unit visitations for each troop and team in the Council for the election of outstanding Scouts to be inducted into the OA. At the same time a presentation will be made on summer time camping. The two Ordeals planned for 2015 are at Rancho Alegre on May 15-17 and August 28-30.
